- Promise Neighborhoods Act of 2013 introduced by Rep. Payne (D-NJ-10) on May 23, 2013

- Promise Neighborhood Partnership Grants
- Promise School Grants
- Planning and Implementation
- Matching Funds
- Evidenced-Based, Results-Focused



- Promise Neighborhood Partnership Grants
- 5 year competitive grants
- Focus on implementing cradle-to-college-to-career supports and services:
 - Early learning programs
 - Effective family/community engagement
 - Services for special populations
- Led by communities in partnership with schools



- Planning and Implementation
- Establishes planning and implementation grant program
- Requires public/private matching funds to participate



- Evaluation- Requires grantees to continually evaluate and improve their programs based on data and outcomes
- Directs the Secretary of Education to evaluate the grant program and disseminate research on best practices

The Early and Secondary Education Act (ESEA)



- ESEA provides funds for schools/school districts with lowincome families for professional development, instructional materials, for resources to support educational programs, and for parental involvement promotion
- Several bills have been introduced to reauthorize ESEA
- We are hoping Promise Neighborhoods will be authorized as part of ESEA.

Appropriations



- Congress must pass appropriations legislation to fund the government (and programs) for every fiscal year.
- The fiscal year ends on September 30.
- If Congress does not act on their individual bills they will need to pass a Continuing Resolution (to provide budget authority for Federal agencies and programs to continue in operation until the regular appropriations acts are enacted).

Current Appropriations Request



- In his FY2014 Budget Request, President Obama requested \$300 million for the Promise Neighborhoods Program.
- The Senate Appropriations Committee approved \$57 million for Promise Neighborhoods in FY2014.
 - The Labor, Health and Human Services, Education and Related Agencies Appropriations Subcommittee had approved \$100m but Senator Kirk (R-IL) offered an amendment to move \$43 million from Promise to the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (IDEA).

Current Appropriations Request



The House Labor, Health and Human Services, Education, and Related Agencies Subcommittee has not taken up their bill yet.

 A mark up was previously scheduled for July 25 but it was postponed indefinitely.

Appropriations History of Promise Neighborhoods



Funding for PN has grown since its inception:

- In FY 2013 under the continuing resolution, PN received \$60 million for planning and implementation grants.
- In FY 2012, PN received \$60 million for planning and implementation grants.
- In FY 2011, PN received \$30 million for planning and implementation grants.
- In FY10, PN received \$10 million

In-District Site Visits and Meetings



- Meeting with a Member of Congress, or their congressional staff, is a very effective way to convey the message about the importance of the Promise Neighborhoods program.
- A site visit can give a Member of Congress a firsthand look at how Promise Neighborhoods programs operate.
- In both cases, your outreach demonstrates your expertise and knowledge and provides Members with a snapshot of what you do on a daily basis

Setting up a meeting or visit



- Remember that recess schedules fill up quickly; it is important to start right away.
- Pick a date for a meeting or visit, but be prepared with alternative options.
- Email the invitation letter several weeks in advance to the Member's scheduler who handles events in the Member's home district. A sample invitation letter is included in the tool kit.

In-District Guide: Information

- Following up with and confirming with the Scheduler
- Preparing for and conducting a meeting
- Setting up and executing a site visit
- What to expect during a visit or meeting
- Following up after the meeting or visit
